Anonymity and the Social Networks

An AA discovers a way in which her anonymity is threatened by an online social group

I am a 50-something-year-old woman who has been sober for over a couple of decades by God's grace and the Fellowship I have found in the Program. I am also a pretty technically-savvy person who has a professional background in technology. I work in a very public arena and although I am open to and always looking for opportunities to live this Program in that arena, I do not believe that anonymity, in the true sense of the word, allows me to publicly advertise the miracle that has been my recovery.



I believe I am only a drink away from my old life and that keeps me attending meetings.

We are blessed in our small town to have a great mixture of all the elements that make up a loving and kind recovery community for the most part and I feel like I need to pass on the things I was taught yet be open to change if I am to continue the legacy of which I am blessed to be a part.

About two years ago I lost my job and I have worked hard to try to turn my part-time employment into a career that may lead me to retirement. I know God has a plan and I try to be open to his leading. Financial insecurity has been an obstacle at times but I believe I am blessed and I know who has the reins. I love my Higher Power in ways that make my life full and I trust him to provide.

Because I am such a nerd, I naturally have a connected life. I have many email accounts, I text with my family and friends, and use the most popular social networking site. I love the faith-filled communication that I share with my friends and family online and since I don't have tons of cash for gasoline, I use this media when I can't visit in person. I also belong to but do not visit very often a social networking site that is based in the recovery community. I use a sign-in name in that community that does not take anything away from my anonymity.

Anonymity to me is the key to this program. If letting someone know I am an alcoholic will be of service to them and is the will of my HP, I am eager to comply. However, beyond that, I must remain anonymous. I was relieved of the compulsion to drink in my first meeting by God's grace, but I am not above drinking, though I pray every morning for that daily reprieve. I am also no better or worse than any of us that have been chosen to receive this miracle. I believe anonymity gives me the right to be wrong, the right to make mistakes, and the right to excel in my life without it reflecting on the program. I am often all of these things for I "am not cured of alcoholism."

Recently, I went on the mainstream social networking site on which I use my full name and was taken aback to find that I had been enrolled in a group that was based on recovery. It made reference to the fact that I was a member of a recovering community, and when I checked out the settings on the group there were no blocks or other protections in place to stop everyone from knowing I was a member of the Fellowship. I was pretty upset about it and I have been doing a lot of soul-searching since it happened.

Many of the people whom I contact through this medium are aware that I consider my recovery to be one of the most wonderful gifts of my life; and, if it were only them that could access my information, this would have been a non-issue. But everyone can find your profile on this site and as I have struggled for these past couple of years to find work, I don't want to have my anonymity broken and possibly lose a job opportunity. I am honest professionally about my recovery but my pathway on that road has always been up to my Higher Power, and I feel like I would like to keep it that way.

I am sure the over-zealous member meant no harm. I think we are all so close and we love each other so much that we sometimes forget that "anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities." But I felt the need to sort this out for myself and I hope we can find a way to adhere to this principle regardless of how easy it becomes for us to stay in touch. — *Caralyn E., Hillsboro, Ohio*

It is easy to let up on the spiritual program of action and rest on our laurels. We are headed for trouble if we do, for alcohol is a subtle foe. We are not cured of alcoholism. What we really have is a daily reprieve contingent on the maintenance of our spiritual condition. Every day is a day when we must carry the vision of God's will into all of our activities. - ◆ It is suggested that volunteer Twelfth Step contacts should state the days and hours when they will be available for calls.
- ◆ Spanish speaking people willing to speak with newcomers calling the helpline.

There is a cell phone that goes along with the book, also there is a format with instructions within the book on how to talk with people calling the helpline. Richie who is the Helpline chairperson, has the book and phone. He will give instruction and answer any questions about answering the phones.
